

**4.1** Write out each of the words below and dividing them into syllables. As you write them, pronounce them syllable-by-syllable (each should contain a vowel or diphthong sound). Then write them again (as one word) and pronounce them.

\* Note: When a consonant is followed by μ, ν, λ, or ρ, they combine so smoothly that the two are often considered a single sound and will begin a syllable (e.g., τρ). So, too, the combination μν is sometimes treated as -μν, while σ and τ slide together to create στ.
